Goals

1. Introduce participants to a novel computer-based simulation experience to raise awareness of the ways bias, health inequities, and SDOH can impact patient outcomes.
2. Gather a network of those interested in piloting this computer-based bias simulation at their institutions.

Learning Objectives

- Recognize implicit biases in the healthcare setting in a screen-based simulation.
- Identify health inequities and connect to social determinants of health.
- Discuss opportunities to change behavior related to health equity.
- Discuss ways this simulation can meet institutional goals related to training healthcare providers regarding implicit bias and social determinants of health.
- Identify opportunities, challenges, key considerations, and resources necessary for a successful pilot experience

Purpose: The University of Alabama at Birmingham facilitates The Health Equity Simulation, which is a computer-based simulation intended to provide students and practicing healthcare professionals the opportunity to understand implicit bias and its effect on health equity.

Health inequity is one of the most vexing problems we face in delivering healthcare. Healthcare providers may not be fully aware of the ways bias in care delivery can exacerbate inequities.

One of the driving forces behind inequitable care is the everyday implicit bias that each of us holds, based on our culture and lived experiences.

This simulation intends to provide a disruptive experience that can be used to educate and prompt discussion around biases in care delivery. The objective of this learning tool is to give practicing and future healthcare professionals an opportunity to increase empathy around and understanding of implicit bias in healthcare.

Who should attend?

This conference is for those looking for novel and high-impact ways to teach about bias, health inequities, and social determinants of health. Attendees may include institutional and department leaders, curriculum developers, educators, faculty, program directors, content developers, academic health care educators, simulation practitioners, and medical directors.
